How shall you plan to seek that which is good for your education?

I hope that all of you will have a very enjoyable vacation and a successful future. I enjoyed my work as teacher and principal at St. Charles where I got to know and like the boys and girls so well. It would be difficult for me to summerize my recollections of what went on from 1956 to 1967. I would like to encourage you to educate yourself and become worthwhile citizens of this fine nation - Canada.

The speech made by Jackie Laird, President of the Student Council was as follows:

As president of the Student Council, it gives me great pleasure to have this opportunity to say a few words to you on this day.

Canadians throughout 1967 are giving a long, joyous and thankful salute to their land and its people for what has been accomplished in the first century of confederation. They are dedicating themselves to the job of making the second century as good, as fruitful and as admirable as the first.

The Dominion of Canada came into formal existance on July 1, 1867, with the union of what are now the provinces of Ontario, Quebec, New Brunswick and Nova Scotia.

Canada is a widely respected country, rich in its various racial sources, in its maternal blessings and with almost unbounded room for growth and worthy achievement as a nation.

In January, 1963, the government created the Centennial Commission and instructed it to promote interest and plan programs so that the Centennial might be observed throughout Canada in a manner in keeping with its national and historic significance. The men and women involved in this organization helped to bring about the formation of the Centennial Train, Caravan and also the handing out of medallions to all school children in Canada.

A solid knitting of Canadians in a common pride in their country and determination to make it greater and more united essentially depends upon the friendly standings of peoples divided by great distances and, in some cases, by language. I hope that all of you will enjoy the Centennial year.

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# Mr. Slonowski's Address ....

St. Charles Home & School Tea - June 6, 1967. 

Ladies and Gentlemen:-In a recent pamphlet, "Your Child is Learning To Read," which I sent to each family at St. Charles School, I quoted an American Magazine which points out the School's responsibility and action in developing character. The article states that the home is the greatest single factor in forming character. But, the school has an even greater responsibility and it takes this responsibility very seriously. The school is fully aware of its partnership with the parents. Any hope on the part of the general public that the schools can do the whole job unaided, is doomed to disappointment. Any attempt on the part of the teaching profession to assume such a staggering responsibility would be certain to end in frustration. The public schools need partners.

Ladies and Gentlemen; Eleven years ago I accepted a position as teacher of a grade 7, 8 & 9 class and principal of 3t. Charles School. At that time there were no pupil records at the school nor was the equipment for good classroom instruction and operation sufficient. We staged a Variety Concert and a Christmas Concert, and raised enough money to purchase the first typewriter and duplicating machine. We invited the people and they came. I found the people very co-operative and willing to help.

It was necessary to create interest in education and I believe that one would have to begin with the home. I called a meeting of the parents and teachers and we organized the first Home and School Association in St. Charles. It would take quite some time to tell you tonight what the Home and School Association had done in the past eleven years to help in bettering the progress of education in St. Charles. I have nothing else but praise for the services this Association has contributed to our school.

Ladies and gentlemen, on several occasions it appeared that the Home and School, Parent-Teacher Association was going to fold, but a little encouragement kept it active. I would suggest that those who take a negative attitude to such a worthwhile association should not discourage others from participating. I hope that you will continue to support the Home and School Association because it is good for the children when they know that their parents and teachers are friends. It is good when teachers and parents get to know each better, and they can only do so by meeting as often as possible.

May I take this opportunity to thank the Home and School executives members for the services which they so willingly performed and for the interest they had taken in helping to promote a sound and progressive education in this district. On behalf of the pupils, teachers and parents, may I extend a very sincere thanks to all of you. To the on-coming executive, I would like to wish you a very successful and enjoyable year.

Because I will be leaving St. Charles at the end of June and because I may not get another opprotunity to speak to you, I would like this opportunity to make several brief remarks.

My role as teacher and principal had always been to provide an educational programme to meet the needs of most pupils; to teach pupils to think critically and become thinking Canadians rather than blind folded sheep. I disliked the last part of June most of all because this was the time when decisions had to be made on promotions. I couldn't see why slow learners were pushed, to complete all the work prescribed for the grade and then require them to repeat the same work the following year. In my experience, a greater percentage of repeaters do worse after repeating the grade. Since 1961, I had attempted several times to promote and introduce the Non-Graded Plan. Two years ago it became a reality and I hope that the principals next year will continue to operate the plan.

My teacher policy had always been and always will be to help him become a better teacher. It is true that the longer I worked as school administrator, the more I realized how important the job is and how difficult it is to evaluate human abilities. For the past 14 years I had evaluated a good number of teachers. This has never blurred or removed my awareness of the crucial role I play in shaping the happiness and the very lives of teachers entrusted to me as I evaluate their capabilities. On my evaluation, much of the teacher's success or failure in life, much of his happiness or misery may depend. I hope that nothing will blur this awareness. The moment it does, I shall have lost an irreplaceable part of my humanity.

My School Board policy had always been that of good co-operation and understanding. What has happened this year, I suppose, I shall never understand. I suppose, I was the victim of personal likes and dislikes. After giving this district eleven years of my services, I don't believe that I was given the professional treatment which I deserved.

Procrustes, you remember, had a bed on which each of his victims was forced to lie. If the victim was too long for the bed, his limbs were chopped off until he fitted the bed; if he was too short, he was stretched until he fitted the bed. The name Procrustes has become a symbol for any arbitrary classification, interpretation. and evaluation. The width and depth of our critical vision are in a real sense the measure of our own personality. The evaluation, unless his insight be infinite, his imagination unbounded, his sensibility universal, is by virtue of his human limitations, in danger of being procrustean at any moment in his career, in danger of measuring against a bed it was never intended to fit. If he is to remain a human being and not a sadistic monster, he must live with the awareness of this terrifying truth. One thing I shall never forget. Something I had learned at Sunday School when I was a small boy. "Do unto others as you would others do unto you"
